72,218 Chum and 40,523 Coho were released from the Outdoor School hatchery to the Cheakamus River and Squamish Rivershed between April and June, 2009.

Spotlight on Alumni

Reflections on the Outdoor School Counsellor experience

The North Vancouver Outdoor School holds many wonderful memories for me, and it proved to be a life-changing experience.

The first time I was a counsellor, there was no Paradise Valley facility yet. I was a grade 11 student at Handsworth, way back in the 1968-1969 school year. Teacher Don Robertson decided to take his grade 7 students from Montroyal Elementary to the United Church camp on Gambier Island for a week of environmental science. This was the original pilot project for an Outdoor School in North Vancouver. I was one of eleven high school counsellors who went along. We did the same things counsellors do today: helped with field studies, ran the recreational activities and stayed in the cabins with the students.

That spring, Don Robertson put together a proposal to the School Board to establish a permanent Outdoor School for the district. He asked me to be part of the presentation to the Trustees, to bring the perspective of the high school counsellors. I didn't have a clue what a Board meeting was all about, but I chatted away about the role of the counsellors and answered some questions from the Trustees. As we now know, the school board approved Don's proposal, and he became the first director of the Outdoor School.

As for the life-changing part, it was the Outdoor School counselling experience that made me decide to go into teaching as a career. Since then, I've taken many classes of my own students to Outdoor School, not to mention enjoying many NVTAs Executive Retreats at the Conference Centre.

History! Glad to have been a part of it!
